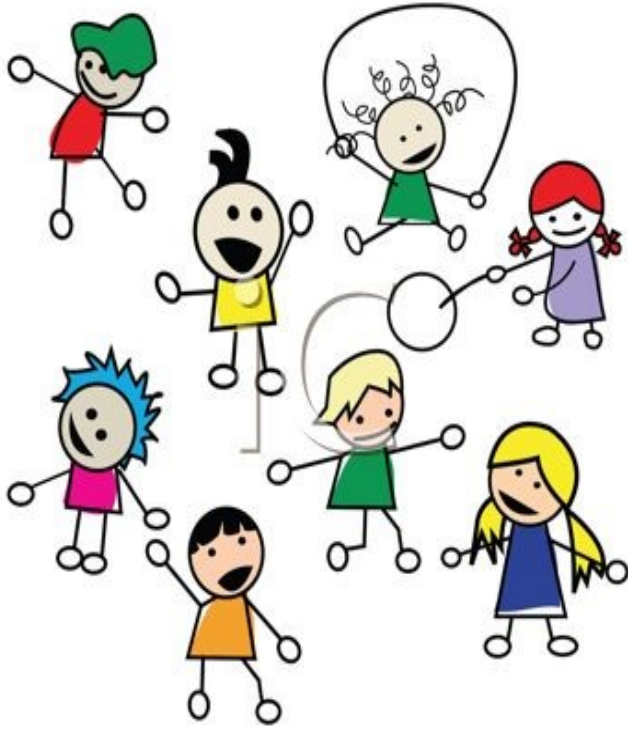
St. Patrick's Day trivia, facts and folklore

What is Daylight Saving Time and where did it originate?

The 2019 *Old Farmers Almanac* gave us the brief history of Daylight Saving time (DST). Please note that the correct term is Daylight Saving (not Savings) Time.

Benjamin Franklin is credited with the idea of DST in 1784, but it was just a joke. It was scoffed at then, and again in 1885.

The Germans adopted DST in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War I. The Brits joined the club in 1916 and the United States in 1918, when

Congress passed the Standard Time Act. Our dairy herds did not care for changing time, so the act was repealed in 1920.

DST was instituted again during World War II and has been in use off and on since then. Currently, DST begins at 2 a.m. on the second Sunday of March and ends at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday of November.

Remember to set your clocks up an hour before you go to bed on Saturday, March 9. You won't want to miss

church because of the time change.

BBB Scam reports range from phishing to jury threats

The Better Business Bureau recently received information from the U.S. District



Court for the Southern District of Indiana and the U.S. Attorney's office warning of an increase in calls to the Court by consumers who have fallen victim to the jury duty scam. This scam is "a nationwide scam in which callers pose as U.S. Marshals or other government officials and claim that the victim is about to be arrested for not appearing for jury duty, but can avoid arrest by paying a fine."

The callers are usually very convincing as they may use names of real court personnel, police officers or sheriff's deputies in their bid to convince you to pay a fine. In fact, the Court indicates that recent callers have also had the victim's work address, home address and date of birth, which further leads victims to believe the call is real. In all cases, they try to convince you to pay a fine through the purchase of a prepaid debit card or gift card or send cash via wire transfer. BBB would like to remind you that none of these payment types are traceable. Once the money is gathered by the caller, you won't be able to retrieve it.

Monthly food boxes available for qualified seniors

Warrick County seniors, aged 60 and older, may qualify for free supplementary food under the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), a USDA program. Annual income of less than \$15,678 (monthly less than \$1307) is the qualifier. More people

If you receive one of these calls, the Court indicates that, "in no instance will a court official, U.S. Marshal, or other government employee contact someone and demand payment or personal information by phone or email." In addition, "a prospective juror who disregards a summons will be contacted by the District Court Clerk's Office by mail and may, in certain circumstances, be ordered to appear before a judge." Furthermore, "a fine will never be imposed until after an individual has appeared in court and been given the opportunity to explain a failure to appear."

Beware of any unsolicited or unexpected communications asking for personal information or telling you to download an attachment. Many of these communications are from imposters masquerading as trustworthy businesses and organizations. They are "phishing" for your Social Security or Social Insurance number, passwords, credit card information, or other personal details for use in identity theft. Don't fall for the bait!

Phishing messages typically use one of three methods to fool victims: 1) the message promises a reward (a gift card, free item); 2) threatens a punishment (unpaid taxes, missed jury duty,

deactivated bank account); or, 3) appears entirely mundane (a file from the office scanner).

Phishing scams tend to follow a pattern. The victim receives an email, phone call or text message (called "smishing" or SMS phishing). In the communication, the scammer urges the target to click a link, share information, or download an attachment which likely contains malware. In the case of an email or text, the link frequently leads to a form, which prompts the target to enter personal information.

Think twice before you download anything from the Internet, especially if it's an attachment from an anonymous sender. Scammers will hide malware in an attachment and once you download it, it can wreak havoc on your computer or steal your personal information.
