hugs and her sweet smile.


Rudy was our man on the treadmill. We know their friends and family will be lost without them. Please keep them in your thoughts.

Our memberships are \$12 a year, so look how much you'll save if you go to both shows.


We only have 15 tickets. If you want to go on either of these trips, contact Barb at 812-853-5627 asap. Seats are going fast.

## Its time to plant the garden



Thanks to Wittscaping, Inc. for the soil and compost for our garden. We are planting all six raised beds this year. Also, thanks to the Friends Night Out Home Extension Club for their donation towards getting soil and plants.

If you'd like to provide plants, we plan to plant cherry tomatoes, large tomatoes, bell peppers, lettuce, squash, zucchini and cucumbers. All donations are appreciated. We'll need four straw bales to cover between plants to prevent weeds.

This summer, we are blessed to have an irrigation system built by Vectren volunteers during last year's United Way Day of Caring. It will make gardening a lot less labor intensive. Ask before you attempt to hook it up and we'll show you how it works.
