Your taste buds don't have too much longer to wait. Porkapalooza 2020 will be here before we know it: September 25 and 26. Colleen Martin is ready to take orders and the famous Newburgh BBQ Coalition is ready to fire up the smokers.

There are a few changes we've had to

make this year, in light of the pandemic. The most important change is there will be no lunch service inside our building. Everything will be drive through.

Don't worry, Debby and Colleen have the logistics all planned, and though it won't be like usual, it will work.

We also will not be holding our bake sale in conjunction with Porkapalooza. Maybe at another date, because it is a great fundraiser for the Center.

There won't be a half-pot, either.

The idea is to still offer fantastic pork while keeping folks as safe as possible. This way, we'll have fewer people in the building, fewer volunteers and less exposure. We know it won't be as much fun, but we have to make do.

We'll again offer a full rack of ribs for \$25; a tenderloin for \$15 or two for \$25; and a quart of pulled pork for \$20.

All orders must be pre-paid this year. There are two ways we're going to do this. Either you can phone in your order and then mail your payment or you can stop by the Center and fill out an order form, then enclose it and your payment in a provided envelope and


leave it in the box. The order forms and envelopes will be in the foyer, so you won't be coming into the building. For mailing, please send to Newburgh Senior Center, 529 Jefferson St., Newburgh, IN 47630.

Once again, we will be selling pulled pork sandwich lunches, both days from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. You can just drive up to our friendly volunteers, place your order and pay them. They will bring your order to your vehicle. The menu is our usual: sandwich, chips and a drink — all for \$5.00. Great lunch, great way to support the Center.

If you want more than four lunches, please call at least half-hour ahead so we can have them ready for you.

To pre-order by phone, please call Colleen Martin at 812-598-8332 or the Center at 812-853-5627. The deadline to pre-order ribs, tenderloins and pulled pork is September 21. Pick up is on Saturday, September 26, 11 a.m.-2 p.m. This, too, will be drive-through only.

This is the last public smoke by the Coalition for 2020, so you'll want to stock up for winter.


Next month, the ninth month, it will be celebrated on September 9. Guess what? In October, Bonza Bottlers' Day will be celebrated on the 10th.

## Another reason to celebrate: the invention of toilet paper

It's only been a few months since our panic stricken friends and neighbors created a toilet paper shortage, to the point where the rest of us sane consumers were developing alternate wiping means, just in case. Some of us remember the Sears Roebuck catalog wasn't just for shopping. Now the shelves are full again and we can breathe easier.

We can thank the ancient Chinese for the invention of toilet paper around 590 B.C. They invented paper in the first place, so toilet paper was a logical next step. But they did not share their comforting idea with the rest of the world. By the end of the 14th century,

the imperial court received seven hundred thousands of the pieces and fifteen thousands of the thickest and softest and aromatic sheets for the imperial family.

It was the 19th century A.D. before the English and Americans stumbled on the idea. Perforated rolls were invented by the Germans in 1930. Each of them counted exactly 1,000 of the small sheets separated by the perforation.

Fifteen years later, a TP plant in London showed the world the first in its ilk: two-ply toilet paper which also featured improved softness and durability.

According to the sources we read, we use 30 billion rolls annually. Putting it simply, that's five rolls a year for the every human under the sun!

## Wayzgoose Day marked beginning of shorter days

The end of summer came early in old-time printing shops. By the third week in August, candles were needed to light the final hours of the long working day, according to a report in *Lloyd's Evening Post*, 1750, quoted in *Notes and Queries*, 4 August 1866.

To mark this shift to winter working, it was usual for the master printer to give his journeymen a feast around St Bartholomew's Day (August 24). This was the *wayzgoose* or *way-goose*. Its earliest recorded use is this:

The Master Printer gives them a *Way-goose*; that is, he makes them a good Feast, and not only entertains them at his own House, but besides, gives them Money to spend at the Ale-house or Tavern at Night. ... These *Way-goose*, are always kept about *Bartholomew-tide*. And till the Master-Printer have given this *Way-goose*, the Journey-men do not use to Work by Candle Light.
